# For foodies

#### A holiday worth all the tea in the subcontinent

India and Sri Lanka are considered international base camp for tea-lovers, second only to China in tea production. Although these two neighbouring countries are revered for their tea, there are key differences in the palette that travellers should know about before setting out on their grand tea quest.

India for example, is most famous for its Assam and Darjeeling tea varieties. If you are partial to a cuppa, then India will be just your cup of tea for a holiday, with the locals' love affair with the popular beverage accounting for close to 30% of global consumption. The brisk and malty Assam leaves are abundant on tea tours in the north east of the country. with some plantations also growing a small amount of green and white varietals boasting their own idiosyncratic spicy notes.

Travellers traipsing through the eastern

parts of India along the Bay of Bengal will find plenty of Darjeeling tea, renowned for its sweet and almost musk spice flavours and aromas, with around 87 tea estates in the region. Some of the popular ones to visit include Avongrove, Glenburn and Happy Valley.

Just across the Palk Strait you will find the ancient kingdom of Ceylon, referred to in modern times as Sri Lanka. The country's humidity and rainfall in the central highlands provides fertile ground for high-quality tea, with locals preferring to drink their hot cup very strong with milk and sugar. The flagship variety here is black Ceylon tea, considered the cleanest in the world and is the flavour behind popular supermarket brands like Dilmah. It typically has mild tannins and is described as being "bold and brisk" by locals.

#### **Princess** doubles down

Princess Cruises has shown its firm confidence in cruising demand from Australia and New Zealand, with the announcement last week that it will deploy four ships locally in 2022/23.

The season will go on sale next week, and will see the 3,560 passenger Royal Princess and sister ship Majestic Princess operating out of Sydney.

Melbourne will have its own homeport vessel in the form of Grand Princess. making her Australian debut, while Brisbane will feature Coral Princess which will also offer a World Cruise out

of Australia as well as a full circumnavigation.

All of the ships will be equipped with Princess' Ocean Medallion technology. A total of 134 departures will be on offer to 108 destinations in 33 countries. with the early release of the 2023 program following huge demand for 2022 voyages, with many already waitlisted.

#### NZ pass trial

Air New Zealand will be one of the first airlines in the world to trial a new digital travel pass being developed by the International Air Transport Association. Currently scheduled to go live on the Apple and Android app stores in April,



the system will be trialled for three weeks on the Auckland-Sydney route.

"Reassuring customers that travel is in fact safe is one of our priorities," said Jennifer Sepull, Air New Zealand's Chief Digital Officer.

"Once borders reopen, travel is going to look very different, with customers' health data needing to be verified at check-in.

"It's essentially like having a digital health certificate that can be easily and securely shared with airlines...this will give customers peace of mind that they meet all travel requirements for the different countries around the world before they even get to the airport," she said.



# **Experiencing authentic Australia**

Taking an Indigenous-led tour offers a glimpse into an authentic Australia, writes Myles Stedman.

Indigenous Australians are known for having cultivated the world's oldest living civilisation – born not just before the First Fleet arrived in Australia, but long before anyone arrived anywhere. For those of us who are more recent arrivals, taking a tour with Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander peoples gives us a chance to understand their history and learn more about the stories of this country. Here is a number of First Nations-led tours through which travellers can breathe life into that history. You don't have to go far for an authentic First Peoples experience, with many operators running tours out of the capital cities. Sydney Rocks Dreaming Tour takes travellers on a 90-minute walkabout in the city's Rocks neighbourhood,

detailing the heritage of First Australians and their connection to Sydney Harbour. Priced at \$45 per person and departing daily at 10:30am, guests will learn about how the local Indigenous people used the land and water, and their connection to not just Sydney Harbour, but Port Jackson as a whole. Before setting out, participants will join in a ceremony in where they accept ochre, and acknowledge the Earth Mother, before hearing about her landscape. The land around Port Jackson was originally colonised by the Eora clans, made up of the Cammeraygal, Gadigal and Wangal people, who lived on the northern, southern and western banks of the shore respectively. A Sydney Rocks Dreaming Tour run by Dreamtime Southern X will show you the land through the eyes of these mobs, over the course of 90 minutes.

If you're keen to step outside the cities for a slightly quieter experience, Bullen Bullen Cultural Tours' Wurundjeri Walking Tour takes guests on a one-hour guided tour, offering a perspective on how Aboriginal people understand the local environment in Melbourne's Dandenong region. Departing twice a day on Tuesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, prices lead in at \$35 for adults, with your Wurundjeri guide to touch on land and water use, as well as the special uses of plants found in the bush. Visitors will also participate in a tanderrum – a ceremony enacted by Victorian Aboriginal nations – allowing safe passage and temporary access on their lands.

If you're after a more "modern Australia meets ancient Australia" approach, Diverse Travel offers an Aboriginal Culture & Quad Bike Adventure. Taking place across 90 minutes, tours run seven days a week at 9.30am and 1pm and depart year-round from Worimi Local Aboriginal Land Council (LALC) in Port Stephens, NSW. Adult departures lead in from \$135, and take travellers through Worimi Conservation Lands' sand dunes – some of the highest in the southern hemisphere - on land that does not open to the public. Riding from bush to beach on quad bikes, guides will inform travellers about bush tucker, teach guests how to dig for fresh water, and visit the Aboriginal sites along the beach. This tour is also owned and operated by the Worimi LALC and the local Aboriginal community – just one of the many nations who shaped the earliest history of our nation, and continue to do so up to today.





For those after an experience a step farther, and a step longer, Girri Girra Aboriginal Experiences is a 100% Aboriginal-owned business operating walking tours around New South Wales' Central Coast. Girri Girra provides three walks of differing lengths - twoand-a-half, three, and four hours, around Bulgandry Aboriginal Art Site. Bouddi, and Yengo National Parks respectively. Tours lead in at \$90, and despite the extended lengths on all three, the bushwalks are classed as "easy". Departures are limited to 15, so as to provide the most immersive experience possible. Tours offer timeless stories, original rock carvings, and pass on Indigenous knowledge about bush food, medicines, spirituality, totems, fire stick farming, stories and dance.

"Australia is now maturing to the point where people are seeking truth, identity and connection," explains Founder & Director Tim Selwyn.

"People want a genuine experience, they want the connection to country Aboriginal people talk about. We need to let our children know they can't just take, they need to always walk with good intent," he said, emphasising the point with the native word "wundarri", meaning "stay in your light". #### **National Civil Rights Museum**

Visitors can take part in a guided tour every hour through the birthplace of rock 'n' roll where you will experience outtakes from recording sessions, touch Elvis' first microphone and hear the real story of the studio that launched the careers of not only Elvis Presley, but Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins, B.B. King, Roy Orbison, Charlie Rich, and many others that signed with the Sun label.

### **Beale Street**

For the live music buffs, Beale Street has always been a must-visit, offering a selection of venues all of which are ready and waiting to welcome back international guests. Start at the blues and jazz bars and clubs, and then wander wherever your ears take you – it won't be far. Not to mention, Memphis is known as the home of barbeque, and good barbeque at that, and Beale Street has got you and your tastebuds well and truly covered!

Museums aren't always a stuffy experience, just take some of these Aussie oddballs which represent aspects of history like no other.



#### Museum of Underwater Art

Talk about a unique feel! Australia's Museum of Underwater Art is the only museum of its kind in the Southern Hemisphere, submerged 15 metres under water off the coast of Townsville, Queensland. In this aquatic cultural wonderland, visitors can swim their way up to sculptures and abstract pieces designed to make them think about the issue of climate change and its effect on natural treasures such as the Great Barrier Reef. Try not to get chatting with any of the local marine curators however, they can talk underwater those guys.

### Skylab's Remains

Skylab was the first space station ever launched into orbit by the United States, and for Millennials and Gen Zs, they may have little awareness about the frantic international headlines this small satellite caused the world back in 1979. Poor NASA planning saw Skylab's orbit begin to decay after losing boost, sending it on a collision course with Earth, but the big question was where? As it happened, debris rained down on the sleepy WA town of Esperance, which is where you can visit Skylab's Remains, a small museum devoted to what fell from the heavens and thankfully, injured nobody in the process.





#### Mad Max 2 Museum

All iconic films have fans, but as we know there are some movie buffs who take their obsession much further than others. And thank goodness they do, otherwise we would not have the Mad Max 2 Museum in Silverton near Broken Hill in NSW's outback. Thanks to Mad Max aficionado Adrian Bennett. there is a museum dedicated to the film franchise that looks authentically apocalyptic just like the films, with props and costumes from the films strewn all over the red dirt, which happens to be where one of the movies was shot. The museum is open daily from 10am to 4pm.

#### David Roche House Museum

Hoarders have earned a bad reputation of late but some people, as it transpires, were well suited to dedicating a lifetime's worth of effort to collecting weird and wonderful objects. Just take art collector and dog breeder David Roche, whose house in Adelaide now stands as a shrine to his vast assortment of decorative paintings. sculptures, ceramics, furniture and kooky clocks. The collection is estimated to be worth around \$80 million and contains one of the largest collections of English and French Empire art and objects outside of the United Kingdom. General tours will cost you \$29.




### Keep your cruising tastebuds tantalised

#### **Prego** Crystal Cruises

Prego serves Northern Italian favourites, with a modern twist and is on board Crystal Serenity and Crystal Symphony. The design is Venetian-inspired, with artfully covered walls, upholstered furnishings, and dramatic lighting. Do not go past the carpaccio di manzo, mushroom soup and slow- roasted pumpkin ravioli, finished with tiramisu. Prego is open for dinner and reservations are required, with one dinner per passenger is included in the fare, with additional visits subsequent charged at \$30 per person. Those on back-to-back voyages or staying in a penthouse category room are entitled to additional dining experiences.



#### Sette Mari at La Veranda Regent Seven Seas Cruises

While La Veranda offers breakfast and lunch buffets on board Regent Seven Seas, when it comes to dinner it transforms into Sette Mari at La Veranda, with an a la carte menu. Enjoy authentic antipasti and Italian specialities, all paired with fine Italian wines. Reservations are not required and you can dine inside or al fresco under the stars. Sette Mari is available on all of Regent Seven Seas' ships.

#### La Terrazza & Spaccanapoli Silversea Cruises

Some of Silversea Cruises' ships actually feature two Italian restaurants, Spaccanapoli and La Terrazza, while others just play host to La Terrazza. Spaccanapoli shares its name with a street in Naples and fittingly specialises in pizza, as that city is famed for. It has a bit more of a laidback feel than La Terrazza and does not require a reservation. La Terrazza on the other hand plays homage to the cruise line's Italian heritage and offers up a selection of the nation's best cuisine. The menu is designed to be enjoyed 'family-style', with dishes perfect for sharing. The pasta is made fresh on board with traditional semolina flour and all the recipes use the freshest ingredients. Guests can dine with a view of the ocean indoors or al fresco.


#### Icon under a microscope

### Irish Chocolate Bailey's Dip

Flavoured with cream cocoa and Irish whiskey, Baileys is always a crowd pleaser when it comes to liqueurs. Take Baileys and add chocolate to it and you've got a sure-fire winner.
